The list order is conform the NG Field Guide to the Birds of N. America, by Dunn and Alderfer (sixth Edition) with the recent changes on the splitting and lumping issue mainly based on publications in the "important magazines". Subspecies is only mentioned when thought to be important and really visible in the field. The totals of birds per species are just a total of the birds I saw to give an idea how many of a species you encounter during a trip. Only species seen are mentioned (with one exception)

On this trip I never looked at a weather forecast, since it was good every day with not much wind and some slight showers, with one very heavy one on the last evening in Florida.

Itinerary

12-04 Flew from Dusseldorf to Miami and picked up the car. I had a short late afternoon drive to Jupiter for the Jays and saw them easily. Later on searched a hotel in Jupiter.

13-04 Drove from Jupiter to Miami and visited several parks for Short-tailed Hawk and ended at Shark Valley in the upper Everglades with no luck. Slept in a hotel on the south east side of Miami.

14-04 Birded several places in southern (Cutler Wetlands) eastern Miami (upper Keys) for STHawk and ended the day at Royal Palms in the northern Everglades. Slept in Homestead.

15-04 Birded the southern Everglades, started at Royal Palm and drove all the way to Flamingo. Slept in Homestead.

16-04 Drove in the early morning to Long Key for a search for Key West Quail-Dove (in vain) and then back to the southern section in the Everglades (again to Flamingo) for further searching for better views of STHawk. Slept again in Homestead.

17-04 Birded the upper Everglades, mainly at Copland because of recent records of STHawk and finally had great views of a light face, later on birded at Shark Valley and returned to a hotel near the airport.

18-04 Flew with the BirdQuest group from Miami to Abaco (Marsh Harbour) and birded at the southern part of the island.

19-04 Birded on the whole of Abaco all day.

20-04 Birded in the morning on Abaco (Bahama Palm Shores) and flew later on to Nassau (New Providence), birded for a few hours in the Retreat and in the afternoon flew to Andros (with a delay)

21-04 Birded all day at Andros in the morning at Blue hole, great day where we cleaned up.

22-04 We wanted to fly from Andros to Nassau but in the morning we where delayed by bad weather. When it cleared they still did not fly. Due to the fact that the BirdQuest people had international afternoon flights we hired a small plane to fly to Nassau where we arrived around 13.00 hour. I birded the rest of the afternoon on New Providence mainly at the former known Rainbow Farm.

23-04 Birded on New Providence, at Paradise Island, the Retreat and the south west of the Island.

24-04 Birded at the same places including the farm on Paradise Island.

25-04 Flew in the morning from Nassau to Miami and later on flew to Grand Cayman and birded in the afternoon (wrecked a car in the meantime, luckily fully insured by Hertz..)

26-04 Birded at several places on Grand Cayman, St Pedro James Point, North side, Hulder road Pig farm and the Botanical Gardens.

27-04 Flew from Grand Cayman to Miami and later on to Dusseldorf to arrive on the 28th in the early morning.

THE BIRD SPECIES

01. *WEST INDIAN WHISTLING DUCK - Dendrocygna arborea

a total of 75 birds seen at three locations on Grand Cayman. The most at Bel air road, a few at the northern site at the pig farm at Hulder road. One bird was also seen at The Botanical gardens. All but one (with a young) where very confiding and sometimes almost at touching range. This is all because they are looked after by the locals.



02. Mottled Duck – Anas fulvigula 14-04 1 ex. seen

03. Blue Winged Teal – Anas discors

A total of 72 seen on several places on the Bahamas and Cayman with migrating flocks past New Providence on 24-04 in the evening (60 birds in total).

04. *WHITE-CHEEKED PINTAIL – Anas bahamensis ssp: bahamensis

05. Lesser Scaup – Aythya affinis

23-04 1 female at a pond on New Providence near Coral Beach.

06. Greater Canada Goose – Branta canadensis ssp: parvipes (?)

19-041 ex at the Treasure Cay golf cource on Abaco. This bird appeared last winterand teamed up with the W.C.Pintails. It looked small but too big and long necked for a Cackling Goose.This bird is probably present from the winter of 2012, or this is a new individual from November 2014.



Northern Bobwhite – Colinus virginianus

A total of 17 seen on Andros and New Providence, this species seems to be introduced.

07. Least Grebe – Tachybaptus dominicus

A total of 10 seen on Andros and New Providence, often calling and in pairs.

 A total of 25 seen spread over the days in the Florida part of the trip. Great birds.

Common in Florida and a total of 8 birds seen at Abaco and Andros.

- 12. Glossy Ibis Plegadis falcinellus Quite common in Florida and on most of the Bahamas, mainly on New Providence.

30. (CARIBBEAN) OSPREY – Pandion halaetus ssp: ridgwayi

21-04 2 ex. seen very well flying over our heads on Andros. These birds had very white heads with a thin dark eye stripe. Also the upperparts where grayish. If you split Osprey this is the reason to do it.

31. Snail Kite – Rostrhamus sociabilis

13-04 3 ex. seen very well hunting at one of the Indian Restaurants along the way at Shark Valley. Great views of at least one subadult and two adult like birds.

32. Swallow-tailed Kite – Elanus leucurus

A total of 55 seen in the Everglades and surroundings, some in small flocks. Great birds, for me it was a very long time no see.



- 33. Sharp-shinned Hawk Accipiter striatus
 - 12-04 1 female flying over the Scrub Jay place.

13-04 seen spread over the day in the Miami city parks.

35. Bald Eagle – Haliaeetus leucocephalus

A total of 4 seen in the Everglades while scanning for STHawks.., all adults.

- 37. Red-Shouldered Hawk Buteo lineatus ssp: extimus

Common in Florida, with active nests with young.

38. <u>*SHORT-TAILED HAWK – Buteo brachyurus</u>

16-04 1 ex. hunting in the Everglades, very far away.

17-04 2 ex., one dark face hunting, briefly and later one light face, seen very well. This last bird was reported there for a few days. There hunting style is very conspicuous. It "hangs" like a parachute motionless in the air near a bush and then dives down.

41. American Purple Gallinule – Porphyrio martinicus

70. Zenaida Dove – zenaida aurita ssp: zenaida

26-04 8 ex. at the Botanical gardens at Grand Cayman, one bird was very confiding and calling. This is (luckily) the same subspecies as on the Bahamas.

Two birds seen in the Everglades and common on the Bahamas and Grand Cayman.

Caribbean Dove – Leptotila jamaicensis

A total of 12 seen on both visits at the Retreat at New Providence. This species is introduced from Jamaica, where I saw them in 1991.

73. <u>*KEY WEST QUAIL DOVE – Geotrygon chrysie</u>

21-04 2 ex. seen very well at Andros near Blue Hole. Found them on call and flushed them from the ground when one of them perched for minutes in a low tree. One of my most wanted for this trip.

22-04 1 female perched on a wire near the airport of Andros. I was completely surprised to find a big white bellied female type martin between the migrating Barn Swallows after a big rainstorm. The bird had a quite clear-cut (from throat/upper breast and flanks) white unspotted belly (so female Purple was ruled out) and very obvious grey large mottling on the total flanks. Caribbean Martin was not completely ruled out but based on the fact that Cuba is much closer to Andros than the more southern distribution of Caribbean and the fact that all Florida records are considered Cuban I choose for this species but see: <u>https://sora.unm.edu/sites/.../p00672-p00673.pd</u>

A total of 5 on the Bahamas.

125. Northern Waterthrush – Parkesia noveboracensis

A total of 3 seen in the Everglades (Anhinga trail).

22-04 1 ex. in the botanical gardens at Grand Cayman.

126. Black and white Warbler - Mniotilta varia

Seen in Florida (2) and on the Bahamas (9), always great to find them working their way around tree truncks

127. *BAHAMA YELLOWTHROAT – Geothlypis rostrata

128. Common Yellowthroat – Geothlypis trichas

Seen on several days in the everglades, one of the most common warblers there.

24-04 1 ex. at the former Rainbow Farm at New Providence.

129. American Redstart – Setophaga ruticilla

3 ex. seen in the Everglades, migration was picking up.

Common (20 in total) on al Bahama islands and on Grand Cayman (7 ex.), migration was "on" for this species.

130. Cape May Warbler – Setopaga tigrina

Very common at all Bahama islands with a maximum of 100 birds on a day (22-04). Great to see this massive movement of the species which is not easy to see in the US.



131. Northern Parula – Sethophaga americana

2 ex. at Anhinga trail in the Everglades.

A total of 54 seen spread over all Bahama islands.

- 132. Magnolia Warbler Setophaga magnolia
 - 17-04 1 ex. at Shark Valley great views
 - 20-04 1 ex. at the Retreat.
- 133. Blackburnian Warbler Setophaga fusca

26-04 1 immature male at the entrance of the Botanical gardens.

- 134. Golden (Yellow) Warbler Setophaga petechia ssp: eoa 26-04 10 ex. singing and seen well on Grand Cayman.
- 135. Blackpoll Warbler Sethopaga striata A total of 7 seen in summer plumage on Andros and New Providence. One seen taken from the sky by an American Kestrel.
- 136. Black-throated Blue Warbler Setophaga caerulescens 16-04

1 male at Flamingo

A total of 7 seen (all males except one) on Andros and New Providence, what a cracker!

137. Palm Warbler – Setophaga palmarum ssp: palmarum

Common in the Everglades and on al Bahama islands with a maximum of 20 a day.

138. *OLIVE-CAPPED WARBLER – Setophaga pity

Common in the South Abaco Forest, great views

139. Pine Warbler – Setophaga pinus

Common on Abaco and in the pine woods of Andros.

140. *BAHAMAN WARBLER – Sethophaga flavescens

18-04 5 ex. seen very well together with Olive-capped Warblers in the South Abaco Forest. The birds feed like nuthatches and there bills are extremely long

141. Prairie Warbler – Setophaga discolor

- 16-04 3 ex. at the upper Keys.
- 19-04 1 ex. at Abaco.
- 23-04 1 male at the former Rainbow Farm.

142. *VITELLINE WARBLER – Setophaga vitellina

25+26-04 3 ex. in total, at Bel air road en The Botanical gardens. Like a very large washed out elongated Prairie Warbler, with a long bill.

143. Northern Cardinal – Cardinalis cardinalis

Common in the whole of visited Florida.

144. *BAHAMA ORIOLE – Icterterus northropi

21-04 3 ex. around the hotel we stayed in Fresh Creek giving all day great views

145. Red-winged Blackbird – Agelaius phoeniceus

Common in the Everglades and a bit less common on Abaco and Andros.

146. *SHINY COWBIRD – Molothrus bonariensis

22+24-04 8 birds in total, all but one adults in the former Rainbow farm. A quite important species for me as an Holarctic birder. I failed in Flamingo.



147. Bronzed Cowbird – Molothrus aeneus

14-0415 ex. seen very well with the males in courtship (with the red eye)around Cutler Wetlands. Great views.

148. Brown-headed Cowbird – Molothrus ater

15+16-04

40 ex. in several flocks around the campground of Flamingo.

- 149. Common Grackle Quiscalus quiscula Seen almost daily in small flocks in the Everglades, sometimes mixed in with the B.H.Cowbirds
- 150. Boat-tailed Grackle Quiscalus major

Common in the whole of Florida, one the most abundant bird species noted.

151. Greater Antillean Grackle – Quiscalus niger

21-04 2 ?? ex. seen on Andros near Fresh Creek while searching for Shiny Cowbirds. A middle sized black crackle with a white eye. This is a very strange record because there are no known records of crackles from Andros.

Common on Grand Cayman.

152. Bananaquit – Coereba flaveola ssp: bahamensis + sharpei

A total of 14 seen spread over all the Bahama islands and common on Grand Cayman.

153. Yellow-faced Grassquit – Tiaris olivaceus

26-04 6 ex. seen at the Botanical Gardens on Grand Cayman.

154. Black-faced Grassquit – Tiaris bicolor

Quite common on all visited Bahama islands, with the most common on Abaco.

155. Greater Antillean Bullfinch – Loxigilla violacea

Seen on al Bahama islands with a total 10 birds, the most on Abaco. Great birds when you see them in good light.

156. <u>*Cuban Bullfinch – Melopyrrha nigra ssp: taylori</u>

- 159. Painted Bunting Passerina ciris
 - 16-04 2 ex. off which one adult male (!) at Flamingo giving great views.
 - 22-04 1 female in the garden hotel of Andros

Finally a male after many years with only a female on my list.





The Bahamas and Cayman are great birding and all these Florida rarities are common at less than 100K from Florida.
